The Jarvis-Gann property tax reform initiative, mandated by California voters on June 6th, spelled swift state-wide economic, social and political change, the echoes of which are being heard nationally.

Your LAAS Board of Directors received notice from the California Museum of Science & Industry that its facilities will be unavailable to us during evening hours as a result of a slashed state budget. As a consequence, the July and August meetings have been canceled. Meetings will resume in September--the second Monday, as usual--at Griffith Planetarium.

In lieu of the July meeting, members are encouraged to participate in ASTRONOMY WEST 78, the joint conference of the Western Amateur Astronomers, Astronomical Association of Northern California, the Association of Lunar and Planetary Observers and the Astronomical Society of the Pacific, to be held at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, July 27 - 30. Book Report -by Ed Ehrhart

Celestial Objects for Common Telescopes, Vol. II by the Rev. T.W. Webb deals with objects beyond the solar system. Originally written in 1859 (when the Andromeda nebula was only suspected by some as being extra-galactic) it consists of detailed catalogs describing the exquisite beauty of the heavens. It is definitely worth consulting prior to a night of observing. Revised by Margaret W. Mayall, director of the American Association of Variable Star Observers, and republished in paperback by the Dover Press, this book is still a classic.
